It involves over 100 organizations, large and small, local and international, and began in 2008 to wrestle with these fundamental questions:

GCF has always pursued the challenge of what becomes possible together that is not possible alone. At its heart therefore GCF is a partnering community, committed to Kingdom-focussed collaboration.

To help us make the fullest use of our time, you will see that the program reflects a commitment to investing together in work teams (blue sessions). Some of these have already been active before this gathering and others will begin in Addis. Some are focussed around specific needs or partner networks, others will be shaped by you and the discussions that we have together on site around families on mission.

It is hoped that these groups will take on a role and life beyond our time in Addis, so please be prayerful about where you sense God may be encouraging you to get involved. The work teams will allow us to focus our involvement and collaboration, to do this, it is suggested that each person commits to just one team for the duration of the forum. There will be several opportunities to hear from each of the groups during the forum and for sharing and cross-fertilising between groups. This is one of the joys of being together in a collaborative space, being shaped by as well as contributing to the thinking and activity of us all.

More information will be shared on site in Addis, but do check out the group summaries listed in this booklet for an overview of the groups and hoped for outcomes. Remember that in addition to these, we will also get to shape several further groups together, around the families on mission theme.

São Paulo Statement on Families on Mission

God has created us to be in **communities**, the smallest of which are **households**. These combine with other families to form larger communities (villages, cities etc.).

Together, Christian homes form churches.

All these Christian families are called to be '**on Mission**': shaping both the lives of their own families and the lives of others, being **salt** and **light** in society and calling each other to **reflect the image of God**.

What if **every Christian household** embraced being on Mission? What if **all Churches** supported those households to be on Mission so that the Church became what God intended the Church to be, together **impacting wider communities**?

What if, together, Christian households were like '**cities on a hill**', shining light and bringing hope to others?

Such a vision calls for all Christian homes to be '**Families on Mission**', reflecting the purpose, identity, and calling of Christian families.

We pray that we will let the love of Jesus into our homes to share His light with others.

About Families on Mission

There has been growing momentum around the needs of families and how we can best serve them alongside children. Recent discussions posed the challenge of how we might see a million families around the world embracing what it means to think and act missionally. Looking at the needs around us in our world, and as Kingdom partners, we began to dream how we might see God open a way to equip and release 100 million missional families as we explore and serve together.

In March 2023 we met in São Paulo as a collaborative partnering forum bringing together teams from GCF, GOPlay, Go Health & Fitness, Generous Generation, family.fit and Rede Mãos Dados. Together we seek to serve children, young people, and families with a special focus on missional families, exploring how we can grow as learning communities, incubating infectious ideas together and including a special focus on investing in younger leaders.

The São Paulo forum initiated a number of working groups and projects. These included looking at local churches, the role of parents and grandparents, the regional, global and digital scope, and a special group exploring the whole area of generosity.

Conference map & Important conference information



The Conference is being held at the Grand Eliana hotel in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

- Be prepared for the high altitude. Addis Ababa is located at 2,370 meters (7,780 feet) above sea level, so it may take some time to adjust.
- Drink plenty of water to stay hydrated.
- Be respectful of Ethiopian culture and customs.

This beautiful hotel offers some things free of charge, and some with payment:

- WiFi, Swimming and Gym are free
- For Spa there is payment
- There are shops and ATM within the facility.

Eliana mall - located adjoined to the hotel is all in one destination for shopping. Eliana Mall is full of different shops, banks and agencies.

Local food

Try some of Ethiopia's delicious cuisine, such as injera (a flatbread made from teff flour) and wat (a stew made with meat or vegetables).

Security and safety

It is advisable not to walk alone in the evenings. Walk with another person or in groups. It is better not to take chances and use common sense to keep you and others safe. Preferable to hold bags in front of you.

Mealtimes at the Eliana Hotel

Breakfast will be at the hotel where you are staying and all other meals are provided at the Eliana.

Please be mindful of mealtimes in the program. The restaurants are open for:

- **Breakfast: 6.30-8.45 am at the Soho Terrace Restaurant** (*until 10am on non program days*)
- **Lunch: 12.30-2.00pm at the Ballroom area** (tea breaks also in this area)
- **Dinner at the Soho Terrace Restaurant: 6.30–9.30pm**

For those staying at the at the Churchill Hotel

Breakfast at the Churchill Hotel is from 6:00 a.m. and ends at 10:00 a.m. The dinner kitchen is open 24 hours at the Churchill.

Distance between Eliana and Churchill: Distance is about 0.5 km and walking can take between 6min. to 8 min. depending on how fast you walk. Please leave time to get to the program on time.

Wifi

The WIFI strength is 100Mb and you will get the provision in all places such as rooms, halls, dining places and cinema.

Market / store

The Eliana is next to the Eliana Mall.

Eliana Mall boasts a variety of shops, including international brands such as Zara, H&M, and Mango. Visitors can also find local Ethiopian brands and handicrafts, making it a great place to shop for souvenirs and unique gifts. The mall is also home to a large supermarket, where visitors can stock up on groceries and household essentials.

Note: Branded shops will take credit cards and most local shops will require cash.

About Addis Ababa and Ethiopia

Addis Ababa, which means "new flower" in Amharic, was founded in 1886 by Emperor Menelik II. The city quickly grew in importance, and in 1936 it became the capital of Ethiopia. Today, Addis Ababa is a major center for diplomacy and international affairs. It is also home to the African Union headquarters and the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa.

Ethiopia has a long and rich history dating back thousands of years. Ethiopia is one of the oldest countries in Africa, and in the world, and has never been colonized by a European power.

Addis Ababa is the highest capital city in Africa, with an average elevation of 2,370 meters (7,780 feet). It is the 4th highest capital city in the world.

Ethiopia is home to the oldest known human fossils, including the famous "Lucy" skeleton.

Ethiopia is the birthplace of coffee.

Ethiopia is the only African country to have competed in every Olympic Games since 1960.

Addis Ababa is home to the headquarters of the African Union.

Here are a few key phrases in Amharic, the official language of Ethiopia:

- Hello: Salam
- Thank you: Ameseginalehu
- You're welcome: Yewolkom
- Goodbye: Yene Habesha
- Please: Bezaf
- Excuse me: Yekeremeta

Overview of the creative thinking process

Overview

Coming to a gathering like this is exciting but also a bit frightening. You may be asking yourself:

- Will I have anything worthwhile to contribute?
- What will happen in the creative process?
- What if we all have different ideas that don't match up because we are all so diverse?

Wonderfully, this is the work of the Holy Spirit. He was our first invited guest. In fact, He planned this whole gathering. Please pray for the Spirit's continual guidance.

The creative process is very dynamic and flexible. A small team of facilitators will be guiding us through the process to explore families on mission. We will look at it from many different angles so you will be sure to make important contributions from your experience and context. Working collaboratively is exciting.

Imagine the process like this (maybe close your eyes and engage all your imagination):

The theme of Families on Mission is like a mountain – and we want to climb it.

We can all see the mountain from a distance, simple and distinct, but when we get up close there are many aspects to consider — many valleys and challenges. There are many ways to climb it. The facilitators will be taking us all on an adventure to climb and understand this mountain — sometimes all together and sometimes in smaller climbing parties focused on a different path. Then our job is to make different types of tools and strategies to enable others to climb and enjoy the mountain.

Roles within a work team

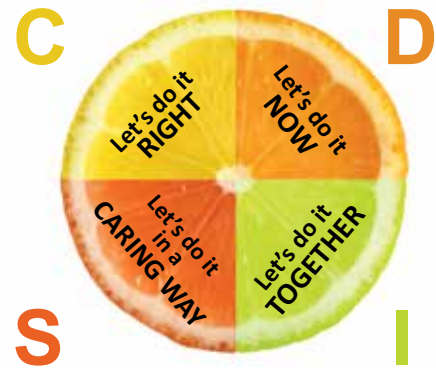
Come to the gathering ready to contribute your ideas. There will be many ways we will be doing this.

Remember to be confident but also have an attitude of humility. There will be people working in English as their second or third language. So, if you are a native English speaker, be a listener first. Give time and space for many ideas from others before giving your opinions.

Facilitator	Clarifies the vision, purpose and audience; supports the team and facilitates the writing process towards the end goal.
Ideas people and visionaries	Contributes ideas to be included as content.
Practitioners	(E.g. pastors, parents, youth workers, instructors, leaders, sons and daughters etc.) Contributes ideas to be included as content. May have multiple roles such as both parent and youth worker.
Writers	Logically document detailed notes of key ideas shared by the ideas people, visionaries and practitioners.
Editor / Finishers	Works with the writer to ensure that the content flows well and to ensure the completion of the resource by checking facts, grammar, spelling, punctuation etc.

Different perspectives and ways of working

The make-up of your team is important. Each person will bring different strengths in how they work. You will find strength as a team as all these individual strengths combine. Here is a way to see how different team members value different things according to the DISC model. All are important.

Post-it note tip

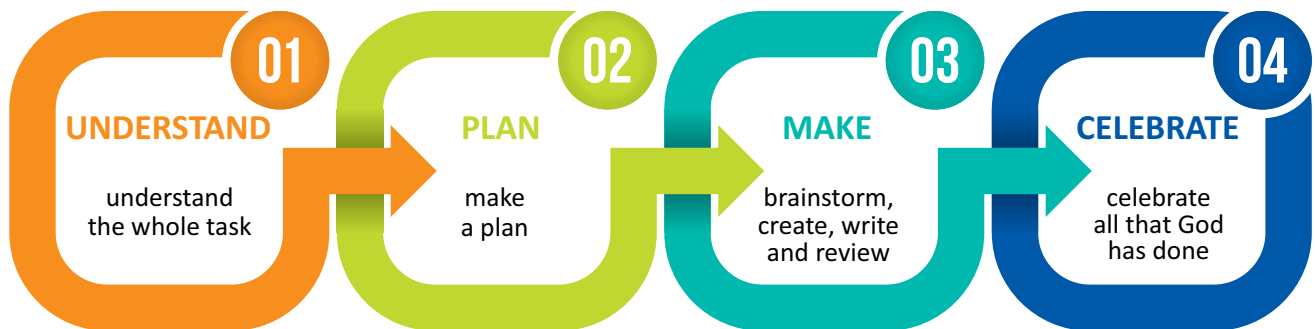
Sometimes we will be brainstorming with post-it notes. Remember to write your idea clearly and concisely with your name on it. For example:

- **UNHELPFUL:** "family money"
- **OK:** "earn money together and give it away"
- **BETTER:** "think of ways to earn money as a whole family, implement it and then decide together how it can be used for others."



FlashLab writing process

Every work team will be starting from a different point, so each one will have different tasks to do. Some teams have no training sessions written in their broad topic, while other teams have most training sessions written. However, as we are creating new tools other than the training sessions, there will be many tasks for each team to do.



This writing process below is indicative only. Each team's facilitator will be shaping a process that will uniquely work for their team. Your team will need to:

1. Understand the whole task

Audit and understand the content area your team is working on. Understand how the sessions / parts fit into the bigger picture of FOM discussions and strategy.

- What new components are you making? Why?
- What is the problem you are trying to solve?
- Understand the templates and how each piece fits together.



2. Make a plan

As you plan, ask yourselves these questions.

- What can we prioritize to do in this FlashLab time frame? (four days)
- What are the gaps and tasks to complete?
- What will be the teams and sub-teams? Roles?
- Who will be doing what tasks?
- How can we continue after Ethiopia?

3. Brainstorm, create, write and review

See the process of 1 to 7 (*opposite page*).

4. Celebrate all that God has done

Let's see what God can do in our midst and for Africa as we labor together.

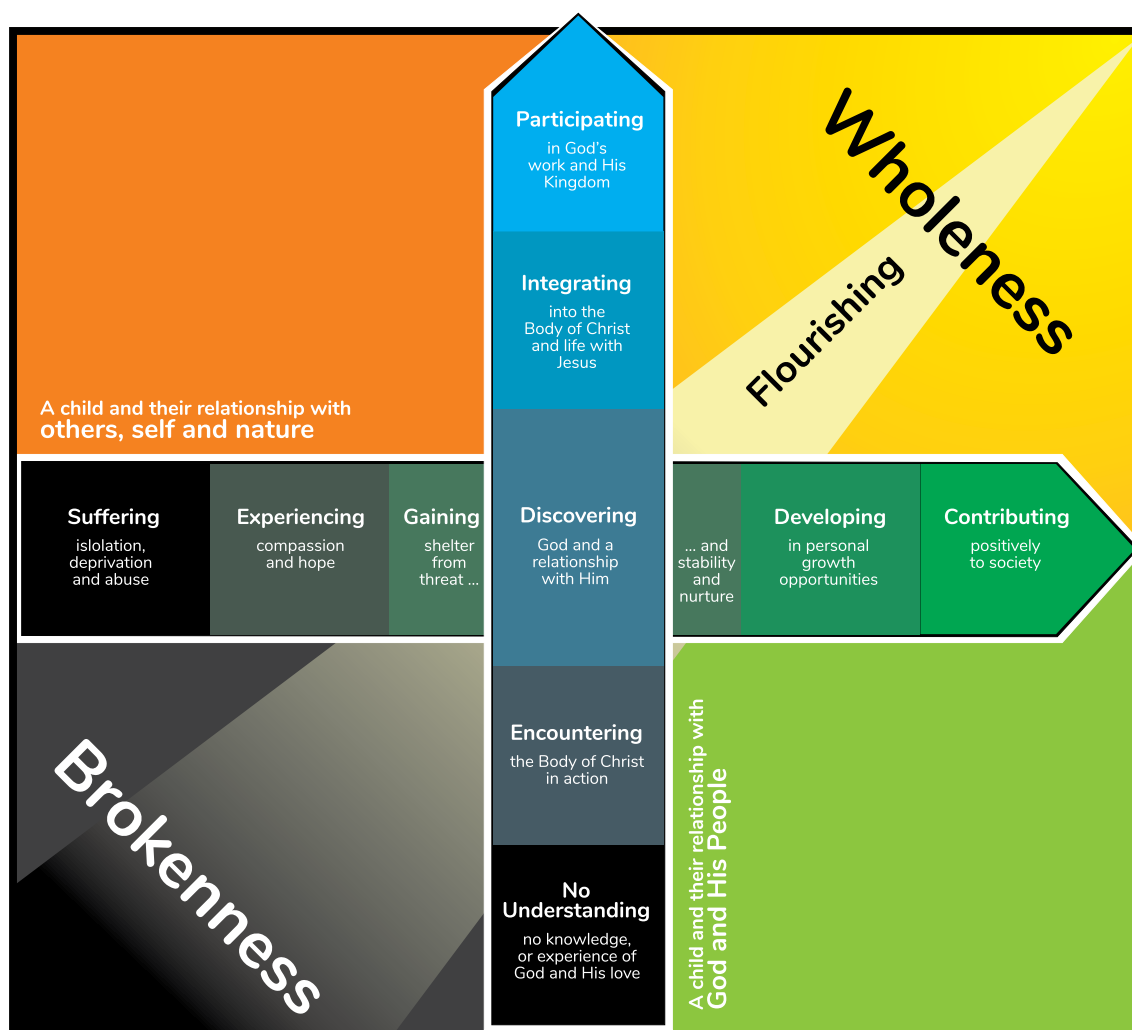


Writing Process Diagram





Brokenness to Wholeness Framework



This diagram shows the path from Brokenness of sin to the Wholeness of shalom.

The two axes represent the two spheres of brokenness:

Horizontal

Physical, personal, social brokenness is evidenced by poverty, war, abuse, sickness, etc. Aid and development programs can help bring these children into a safe and healthy environment where they are enabled to develop personally and contribute to society.

Vertical

Spiritual separation from God through sin and ignorance is healed as the church reaches out, shares the Gospel and guides them into a relationship with God. As part of the community of His Body, their relationship with God is strengthened and they are enabled to become active participants in His work.

All children are currently somewhere on this matrix — experiencing different levels of brokenness and wholeness in different areas of their lives. Our goal is to move them closer to the complete wholeness of Shalom, found in the upper right quadrant.

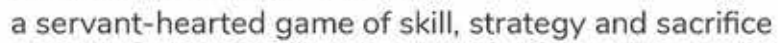

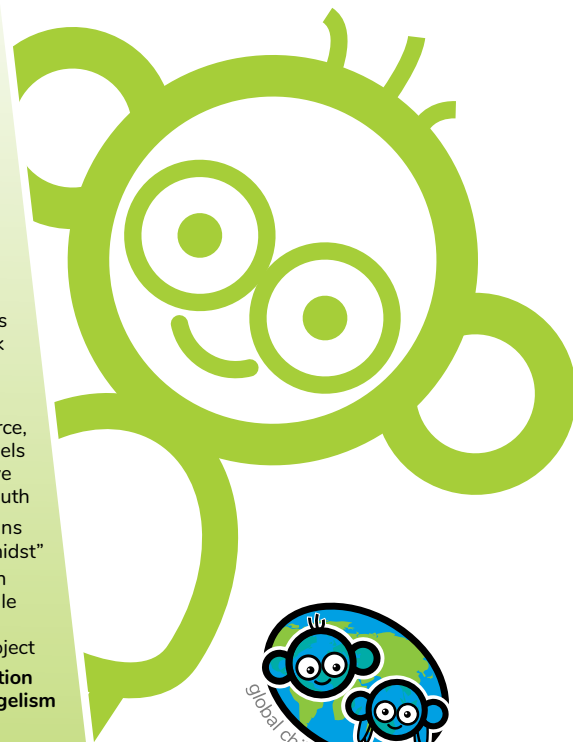

Gen-G (Generosity, children & families)

The Gen-G vision is to ignite and cultivate a global movement of children who joyfully demonstrate God's love through radical biblical generosity, thereby healing the world through their giving. This workgroup will collaboratively explore:

- How to incorporate the Gen-G vision and serve other areas and ministries within the GCF family.
- Reviewing the nine experiences we currently have and incorporating them into various GCF activities.
- Create a Parents/Leaders Toolkit to empower leaders to implement the Gen-G experiences.
- A distribution strategy to deliver Gen-G Keystone Experience Kits to organizations, churches, Christian home schools etc. in each of the five targeted regions in Africa over the next 12 months.
- Consider what else will be needed to empower parents and leaders to easily access Gen-G resources.



Children-at-Risk/Vulnerable Children (Lausanne)

Together we will listen, strategize and collaborate around the issue of children-at-risk/vulnerable children in Africa. We want to see a strong network in Africa and globally that will facilitate and encourage child participation in mission.

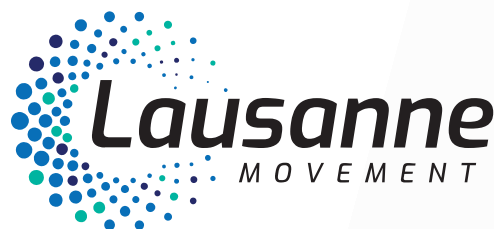
- Gain a wider understanding of the biblical and theological significance for including children-at-risk as key collaborators in mission.
- Understand practical models and best practices for facilitating contextually relevant child participation.
- Consider the barriers to including children-at-risk in mission and discuss how to create spaces where children can have meaningful, safe, appropriate and life-shaping experiences of participation in mission.

Children and Families (Lausanne)

Of the more than 2 billion children in the world, most are unreached. There is great need for intentional focus on long-term discipleship to help children understand the big picture of the Bible and their part in God's big story. As members of a local church body—comprised of pastors, church members, children's workers, school teachers, grandparents, parents, youth, and children—what can we do to help children become growing, active disciples of Jesus for a lifetime?

We want to see a strong network in Africa connecting children's leaders and influencers with ideas, resources, and each other in order to see children everywhere walk with Jesus.

Leadership Experience (LE)

The GCF Leadership Experience (LE) is a one-year life-changing leadership development program for emerging children's ministry leaders. This workgroup will collaboratively explore how to (1) effectively multiply regional expressions of LE, particularly in the African setting, and (2) adapt the curriculum for academic settings.

- Generate creative and sustainable models for regional expressions of LE.
- Begin putting plans in place for LE Regional - East Africa 2025 and LE Global (Asia/Oceania) 2025.
- Expand the conversation surrounding LE and Academia.



Global collaboration

Child safety

Globally child safety is being seen as a pressing issue. As practitioners walking alongside children and teenagers helping them on their journey from brokenness to wholeness, child safety plays a critical role in this process. Whether preventing possible harm, or responding where children have already experienced harm and abuse, practising child safety should be intrinsic to the DNA of our ministry practice.

- How can contextual awareness be raised in our local, national and international settings regarding child safety?
- Do Christians have a role to play in child safety? If so, what can be done to enable this role to be fulfilled?
- How can child safety be positioned as an element which enables ministry to happen rather than creating barriers preventing ministry from happening?
- What is the role of child safety in regards to Families on Mission (FoM) and Children everywhere walking with Jesus (CEWWJ)?



The Emerging Goal: More institutes, colleges and seminaries including children, youth and family as a topic of serious reflection and equipping in their programs SO THAT more leaders are equipped with God's heart for children, SO THAT more children everywhere have the opportunity to walk with Jesus from brokenness to wholeness.
